As we reflect on the past year, it is with great pride and gratitude that I share the achievements of our library. Our commitment to supporting research, fostering lifelong learning, and promoting intellectual curiosity remains steadfast. This year, our library has continued to be a center of knowledge, innovation, and community engagement.

One of our standout accomplishments has been our ongoing efforts to support Open Access (OA) and Open Educational Resources (OER) at SMC. This initiative underscores our dedication to staying at the forefront of academic resources and services, ensuring we meet the evolving needs of our library users.

Work continues on our project "Open Education Resources for Social Justice." This project is supported by a collaborative team of librarians, which included librarians from Loyola Marymount University, the University of San Francisco, and Santa Clara University, all institutions with a social justice mission, and funded with a \$1.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education's Open Textbook Pilot Program for a project. This highly competitive grant program required a compelling case for the need for free textbooks in private colleges and universities. This funding supports 12 faculty teams over three years in creating or modifying open textbooks and supplemental resources. You can read more about this project on page ten.

The College Archives implemented a strategic digitization plan for 2023-2024, prioritizing the most commonly requested items. To

date, the College Archives has nearly completed the digitization of the 1990-present run of The Collegian newspapers, which are now available online (https://smc-archives.libraryhost.com/ repositories/2/resources/18). Through a partnership with SCELC and JSTOR Shared Collections, The Collegian and other archival materials are now accessible via the JSTOR platform. 


Collection Highlights


New Play Exchange

Collection Highlights



Brother Camillus Chavez Collection

This collection, an initiative by the Institute for Latino and Latin American Studies (ILaLS), with additional support from SMC Mission and Ministry and the Department of Psychology, is named in honor of Brother Camillus, who was a key presence on the campus and shaped and influenced the lives of many generations of students at SMC. Br. Camillus led meditation sessions, taught courses in Psychology, and advocated for students of color. The collection consists of Spanish-language materials including popular novels, children's books, books by undocumented populations and non-fiction that is emblematic of the diverse experience of Latin American and U.S. Latino communities.

The 2023-2024 academic year marked a significant period of growth for the College Archives, characterized by an intensified focus on digitization, outreach, instruction, and the demonstration of the essential research services we provide to the Saint Mary's community and beyond.



Outreach and Instruction



The College Archives is integral to Professor Elena Songster's History Methods class, introducing students to academic archives and potential career paths. The class includes a tour of the Archives.

Additionally, during the 2023 Homecoming Weekend, an "Escape from the Archives" escape room was hosted, where participants solved clues related to SMC history to find Slip Madigan's 1932 flask.

Hold it Lightly Collaboration



The past academic year featured a collaboration with the SMC Museum of Art on Lisa Congdon's Hold it Lightly exhibition. The exhibition showcased Congdon's personal items, including photographs and scrapbooks, creating a gallery space with interactive elements for sharing memories.

Artifacts displayed included her thesis, scrapbooks, and student IDs. Materials were digitized post-exhibition, now available for in-library use only.

OER Grant Update

Last year, the SMC Library began work with three other private Catholic California Colleges on the OER for Social Justice grant awarded by the Department of Education to incentivize faculty to create and use Open Educational Resources (OER) that focus on social justice. The SMC teams have been hard at work this year planning the structure and content of their OERs, as well as the plan for piloting the texts in Spring 2025.

Faculty Profiles

For the past several year, librarians have had a large hand in updating and maintaining the Faculty's online scholarship profiles. This past year, we had to undergo a large migration project, as the profile system we had been using was being discontinued.

The alternative platform we've moved to is an improvement.

Data migration was completed in March 2024, and during the summer, subject librarians reviewed the nearly 400 profiles and began to work with faculty to polish their profiles.

Scholarship profiles not only help faculty promote their scholarship and creative works but also showcase the faculty expertise of the College.
